
How do we make it work for all women?




















Across the Global South, women and girls have **limited access to ICTs**.

Key obstacles include:



Unaffordable internet services



Lacking or outdated digital devices



Poor **network quality**



Limited or lacking digital skills





Across the Global South, "invisible" barriers prevent women and girls' full and equal participation in our digital present.

These include:



Low confidence in digital ability




Socio-cultural **perceptions of their role** within the family/household



Community perceptions of what is acceptable







Across the Global South, women and girls' **online safety** is significantly threatened.

Key challenges include:



Limited framework protecting against online abuse, particularly that of a sexually explicit nature




Language limitations of existing protective measures



Limited data protection



Current **indicators** of digital access **don't adequately reflect** the reality of the digital divide.



In particular, evidence stresses:



The limits of internet penetration as a measure of digital access



The need for data **disaggregation**



The implications of data **gaps**
