# Local Solutions to Global Challenges : Financing for Development in a Shifting Geopolitical Landscape

In a world increasingly marked by polycrisis, from pandemics and climate shocks to spiralling debt and fragile health systems, communities and countries in the Global South are on the frontlines of global challenges. Global South countries are most affected by these crises, with impacts exacerbated by financing challenges including limited fiscal space and increasing debt. This session aims to dive deeper into these topics highlighted in our latest publication, Global South Perspectives (GSP), and connect them with the discussion on financing for development.

Building on the recent FfD4 conference in Seville and Southern Voice's positioning to advance the financing for development agenda reflected in our <u>Joint Statement on Financing for Development</u>—which highlighted the need to expand fiscal space for countries to fund essential services such as health, including through debt relief, tax reform, and multilateral development bank reform. This session offers a timely space to reflect and reinforce the need for Southern solutions to global crises, and stronger leadership and agency.

The upcoming conversation will highlight country-specific cases on **debt sustainability and healthcare access**, demonstrating two types of Global South contributions to global challenges:

- Globally relevant policy thinking: A GSP researcher from Sri Lanka offers
  concrete proposals to reform financial systems to address debt
  sustainability. These contributions reflect the Global South's capacity to
  inform and shape international development debates, not just respond to
  them.
- Context-responsive, community-based strategies: Research by GSP researchers in Nigeria highlights expanding equitable health care access. Drawing on lessons from local interventions, this work highlights the importance of institutional flexibility, technology, and community engagement in building resilient systems lessons that are increasingly relevant beyond the South.

Together, these perspectives challenge outdated notions of where expertise comes from, repositioning the Global South not as a passive recipient of global solutions, but as a dynamic source of knowledge, strategy, and leadership in development thinking.
